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INTRODUCTION

We recognise the limited role of the Town Council but believe genuinely that the time is right for towns like Frome to have a greater influence over their own destiny. We believe that this Town Council can sow the seeds of long term change, and make key decisions which will enable Frome to be more resilient and better able to take advantage of the challenges that lie ahead.

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Report from Cllr Mel Usher, Leader of the Council

Where to start?

At times I am equally excited and depressed about what we have achieved as a council. The excitement comes from making things happen locally, it's great to be able to say "yes" we have been involved in finally getting the Cheese and Grain improved, "yes" to opening a new vast allotment site at Birchill and "yes" to the revamped markets in town. It's positive to realise that the town is holding steady during a deep recession; we continue to generate generous media interest, locally and nationally.

Unemployment is relatively low but bit by bit traditional industries are disappearing, although many are replaced by numerous new start-ups. It's a precarious position but one where we are currently on the right side of the line....just.

The standout moment for me in the last year? The opening of the new Health Centre next to the Community Hospital, both buildings providing services of which we can be proud.... and great selling points for the town.

The depression? Well it's just that, the country is in the grasp of an austerity fever. Many traditional institutions seem to have lost their nerve, retreating into hibernation mode rather than rethinking their role and delivery mechanisms. The Town Council is working hard and optimistically, ensuring that Frome stands out amongst the many other towns in the South West clamouring for investment.

We need to accept that local government as we know it will never be the same across the country; as a town we are very much on our own. That's why I for one am not embarrassed about strengthening the council workforce and indeed investing some money to ensure a brighter future. What's required now, from Mendip District Council in particular is a recognition that we all need to be bolder, quicker and more radical in our thinking. That's why we pushed hard to establish "One Frome", a forum for all elected councillors representing the town. Together we will have a clearer voice and be much stronger.

The current administration has spent two years working on a number of projects not normally associated with Town Councils. Many are now coming to fruition. For example, the Market Place is the centre of the town but is divided by a busy road where pedestrians are alienated. We have developed a new scheme that will

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remodel this space and create a pedestrian friendly and vibrant centre to the town. With a fair wind this project will be completed in 2014 although once again funding will have to come from what we can scrape together.

The Cheese and Grain is sublet to a Trust by the Town Council and we have been working with them to create a new animal; more spaces for community use, a new entrance and bar, an enterprise centre and a cultural hub that the town can be proud of. This project will be completed in 2013.

The river corridor that runs through the centre of town has been ignored by developers and councils in the past and we have turned our back on something rather special. This Council wants to reverse this and we have developed a project with the Friends of the River Frome, to make the river the heart of the town. New walking and cycling routes and vastly improved management of the river banks and adjacent open spaces will link the centre of the town with the surrounding countryside for both the community and wildlife. We will soon be purchasing an extension to Rodden Meadow to gain better access.

There is a part of Frome that we are not proud of. The Saxonvale area of town, adjacent to the main shopping area, beside the river and bordered by residential areas, is derelict. Documents dating back to the 1990s talk about "when this area is developed". Taking advantage of a unique opportunity the Council decided to buy a part of the site in order to protect employment training facilities in Frome that were at risk of being lost. This acquisition has also enabled the Town Council to bring together the additional 6 owners of the site in order to create a development that Frome expects: one that is of high design quality with a mix of development including small retail units and self-build housing as well as walking routes to other parts of the town along the riverside. We expect that in 2014 plans will have progressed to make this vision a reality although the other players in this marathon dance of development are extremely coy about their proposals.

Finally a word about 2013/14. We have well worked out plans as you can see but rising in significance is poverty. Those less well off in society are being squeezed disproportionately - we are not "all in this together". More Frome residents will have difficulty paying their bills, isolation will increase and there will be less help available from traditional agencies. We would like to assist where we can and will be announcing proposals later this year to at least making a contribution on this front.

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Initiating and finishing projects like those described here need a staff body that is able to deliver. During 2012-13 the Council re-structured and created a series of new posts. These include an Economic Development Manager, a Town Centre Manager and a Community Projects Officer. All three posts reflect the Council's ambition to support the community to make Frome the one of best small towns in the country (whilst still keeping it just a little bit weird!)

REPORT FROM THE MAYOR 2012-2013 - Cllr Pippa Goldfinger

My year as Mayor has been a great and enlightening experience and, as Frome is such an active town, it has also been extremely busy. I doubt any role gives a person such an insight into the many and varied activities of the town and the great energy of the people who drive them. Part of the role involves attending civic events in other towns, I attended 81 events in total and I have to say that these have only served to highlight what a very special place Frome is.

I began my year as Mayor in 2012 the Olympic Year and it was my great pleasure to present special sporting Civic Awards to three prominent local Champions; Bridget Parker, Petra Wiltshire and Paul Mattick on behalf of Frome Town Council. This presentation took place at the Mayor's Charity Tea Dance which was my fundraising event and I would like to thank the musicians Shazam, Frome Ukulele Club, Miss Cherry Bomb and Honk Monster, dancers lead by FTC apprentice Lyndsey Haines, the crew Lisa Kenwright, Mike 'Herbie' Herbert, Finn Feeney, Django Lewis-Clark & Alfred & Will Yapp, the caterers Food Frome and Frome WI as well as Lolita Noir who added a touch of glamour to the proceedings.

In September I was cajoled into taking part in the Carnival sitting on a 'throne' in the back of the FTC electric pick-up truck in my regalia being fanned by demi-naked gold painted men (my finest hour!). The best comment of all was from a little girl who asked her granny if I was the Queen!

In April the Town Council hosted the Annual Town Meeting, an event hosted by the Mayor for the people of Frome. We put a lot of effort into publicizing the event (with funky posters by Anthony Oram), provided delicious food from Frome WI and had live music from Honk Monster all to make the meeting more appealing for people of all ages. The hard work paid off and I welcomed over 150 people to the Merlin Theatre for lively and good-humoured debate.

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This was the occasion for presenting the Civic Awards and after much deliberation I decided to award these outstanding citizens of Frome:

Dorothy-Anne Bryant

Dorothy-Anne is a very active member of Friends of the River Frome and gallantly organises litter picks on a regular basis. Her hard work and dedication are combined with a great sense of humour so that there is nothing dull or boringly worthy about her work. This kind of upbeat enthusiasm is inspirational to others and Dorothy-Anne is involved in many other projects that make Frome a better place, some through Hope Frome which is a kind of direct action Christian group that puts faith into action rather than words.

Charles Wood

Charles Wood has worked on one of the largest scale consultations that have taken place in the town, Vision for Frome. This important body of work is not gathering dust on a shelf in the Council offices but is instead the cornerstone of our Strategy for Success and a vital tool for neighbourhood planning and town centre remodelling. He's also a jolly good egg and was a founding member of the charity Active & In Touch which I chose as one of the Mayor's charities. Charles brings his wealth of experience and open-mindedness to the voluntary sector for the benefit of Frome.

Gary Collinson

Gary is the Community manager for Frome Town Football Club and combines great enthusiasm and tenacity with the imagination to do things differently. He managed to secure a huge grant (one of only two clubs in the country to do so) for the rebuilding of the stands and continues to look at innovative ways of raising funds and working with different organisations.

Gavin Eddy

Gavin is one of those people who can't help being successful, this might start to grate if it weren't for the fact that he loves his adoptive home of Frome and keeps ploughing his time, money and imagination back into our town. The Artisan, Flea and now Super Markets have been a great success story for Frome bringing in visitors and giving a sense of occasion to the first Sunday of the month. He combines his skills with a real passion for getting things done – a great ambassador for Frome.

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Tabby Lawson Coe, May Schymzk and Leanna Denwood

These young girls were so impressive when they gave the Town Council a presentation over a year ago that I felt they should all get an award. They identified a problem (bullying in the park after school) and devised a solution – play equipment, activities and a sense of ownership. Not many adults are as enterprising as these young girls – very impressive!

Mayor's Charities

The charities I chose to support were **Positive Action on Cancer** who, I believe, fulfil a vital role in providing emotional support to those affected by Cancer. It was fantastic to work alongside Kelly Hall PAC's dedicated fund-raiser and I was happy to collaborate with Kelly and Jude Kelly of La Strada on an ice-cream flavour completion which will continue to raise fund for PAC throughout the summer.

I was introduced to **Active & In Touch** identifies and supports isolated people so that they can take part in the many activities which take place in Frome and become more integrated into the Community. It was great to work alongside Julia and Lucia in order to raise both funds and awareness of this new charity.

The Gateway Club run by Jan & Anne Taylor was a charity that my predecessor Cllr Nick White wished he had known about at the beginning of his year as Mayor so I was more than happy to raise funds for the important work they do for adults with learning difficulties.

In the same vein I have recommended the charity 'Open Storytellers' who work with adults with learning or communication difficulties to the new Mayor of Frome Cllr Dickon Moore.

Lastly I'd like to thank everyone who invited me to the myriad of events I attended and made me feel so welcome. I've enjoyed getting to know you and the town better and will be participating in some of the events and organisations I've come across and been inspired by. There really is no place like Frome!



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Report from Cllr Toby Eliot, chair of the Internal Affairs Committee

My committee could well be described as the “behind the scenes” committee as it deals with finance, staffing and how we manage our estate.

Staff

From the start of this administration our aim has been to drive the council to do more beyond its traditional role in order to deliver an ambitious strategy. In order to achieve this we’ve had to make the Council and its staff more outward facing and more flexible. Two years ago all the council’s posts we focused on delivering what the Town Council has traditionally delivered, parks and open spaces, TIC and community events and planning – the core business. It was very inward facing.

Since then we have created a structure that is much more outward facing; we have created new posts: Town Centre Manager, Economic Development and Regeneration Manager and Community Projects Officers. Our Outside Services Team now has a much broader remit that just looking after the parks. For example, we now have someone keeping the town clean and tidy seven days a week. And the structure itself is flatter with fewer managers and more specialists.

In short we now have a staff body with a heavy focus on the community we serve.

Budgets

Frome Town Council has now delivered a full year of a balanced budget. This means our outgoings match our income and we don’t rely on savings for funding ongoing costs.

All Councils have to pay for things like insurance, estate management, utilities and staff. What this Council has done differently however is shifted the balance. We have allocated serious amounts of funds to community grants, to supporting young people and businesses in the town. In real and proportional terms we are spending less on our fixed costs.

Importantly, this council has worked to reduce the level of general reserves - the money the council has in the bank. This doesn’t mean that we’ve blown all the saving but that we allocated the money to important community projects.

In short we now have a budget with a heavy focus serving the community.

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Allotments

The new allotment site on Burchill Lane is a perfect example of how we staff are employed and the budget is available to serve the community.

The Council worked in partnership with the Allotment Association and the Frome Development Community Interest Company to find and jointly fund a new allotment site. We had Frome Town Council experts on hand to help negotiate the transfer of the land and help in the onsite work and, finally, by allocating reserves and making savings elsewhere, we had the cash available for the purchase.

The Outside Services team helped to set up the site and we continue to work in partnership with the Allotment Association to keep our allotment gardens the envy of many.

Report from Cllr Peter Macfadyen, chair of External Affairs Committee

The External Affairs Committee covers everything which we **support**, rather than directly control. This structure gives us clarity and transparency. The ethos of this council is about supporting the community to help itself within a strategic framework.

We do this in two ways

1. Getting more people involved.

For example, trying to open up meetings and increase participation. We've now often had 20 or 30 people at External Affairs meetings – twice as many as in the past. As councillors we are not necessarily experts in anything, certainly not everything, and there is a vast pool of skills and experience in Frome. We've brought experts from the community in to tell us what to do on open space and sports strategy and are have started to look at walking and cycling, ethical policy, and the council's response to poverty.

This gives us a framework in which others can operate in a joined up way.

2. Supporting community based organisations.

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This year we have developed stronger partnerships with organisations like FROGS, and Friends of the River Frome. Partnerships like this have led to significant achievements this year in the Pump Track at Welshmill Park and a river corridor strategy which we shall be jointly implementing in 2013/14. We are also supporting community ownership of events such as the Christmas Extravaganza –using local expertise and spending money in Frome.

A key area of work has been around community grant making. We have rebuilt the way we award grants. Frome gives far more money out in this way than other councils and again this has increased this year. We provide small grants of up to £300 and larger ones of up to £5,000 last year.

Core to our community grants is to support local activity and community building. We have also contracted Greenstrand to work closely with us to supply professional support with fundraising. I should also mention the Council's close relationship with the Frome Development CIC which provides around £50,000 of grants to community organisations each year. We often co-fund projects. The best example is the CIC and Council worked together to purchase the new land for the Allotment Association that Toby Eliot mentioned above.

The External Affairs committee also oversees the Council's work on the Neighbourhood Plan which will be finalised later in 2013. We also drive forward the Keep Frome Clean campaign as well as the marketing of Frome.

The Community Toilet Scheme we started in 2013 sums up much of what we have achieved and want to achieve in the future. When the new council took over we found ourselves paying £16,000 a year for the one public toilet which didn't seem good value. So instead we developed the Community Toilet Scheme and now have eight businesses offering facilities in the town centre and Badcox. That means higher per head coverage than anywhere else in Western Europe. In another initiative which reflects our ethos, these toilets are being twinned with others in Africa, so money is being raised from Frome users spending a penny to help pay for toilets where there are none!

We have also provided some funds towards the reincarnation of one closed toilet block as an art gallery – though the vast majority of funds have come from the community.

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Overall this has been a year of consolidating the policy of making council business much more open and accessible, continuing to move the focus from the council doing, to the council supporting the community to do. This will be enhanced in the next 12 months by much greater emphasis on innovative public participation.

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Frome Town Council was formed in 1974 following the reorganisation of local government in England and has 17 Councillors representing 6 Wards.

Frome Town Council is the parish authority for the town of Frome and is the largest of the 52 parishes in the Mendip district. It is the third tier of local government working with the County Council and the District Council.

The Town Council provides a community and business leadership role as well as many services to the people of Frome. It also promotes Frome as a destination for future businesses and visitors and represents the town with other national and statutory bodies. The Town Council acts as a consultee and lobbyist articulating and advancing the wishes and needs of the local community.

How Are We Funded?

Each year the Town Council calculates the money it needs to raise to provide its services and any projects planned for the year ahead. Then it deducts the income which it expects to receive from fundraising and other income leaving a net amount that it needs to deliver those services and projects.

This sum, called the precept, is the amount it levies on Mendip District Council and which is collected as a proportion of the total Council Tax paid by Frome households. For the financial year 2012/2013 the precept was £964,609.

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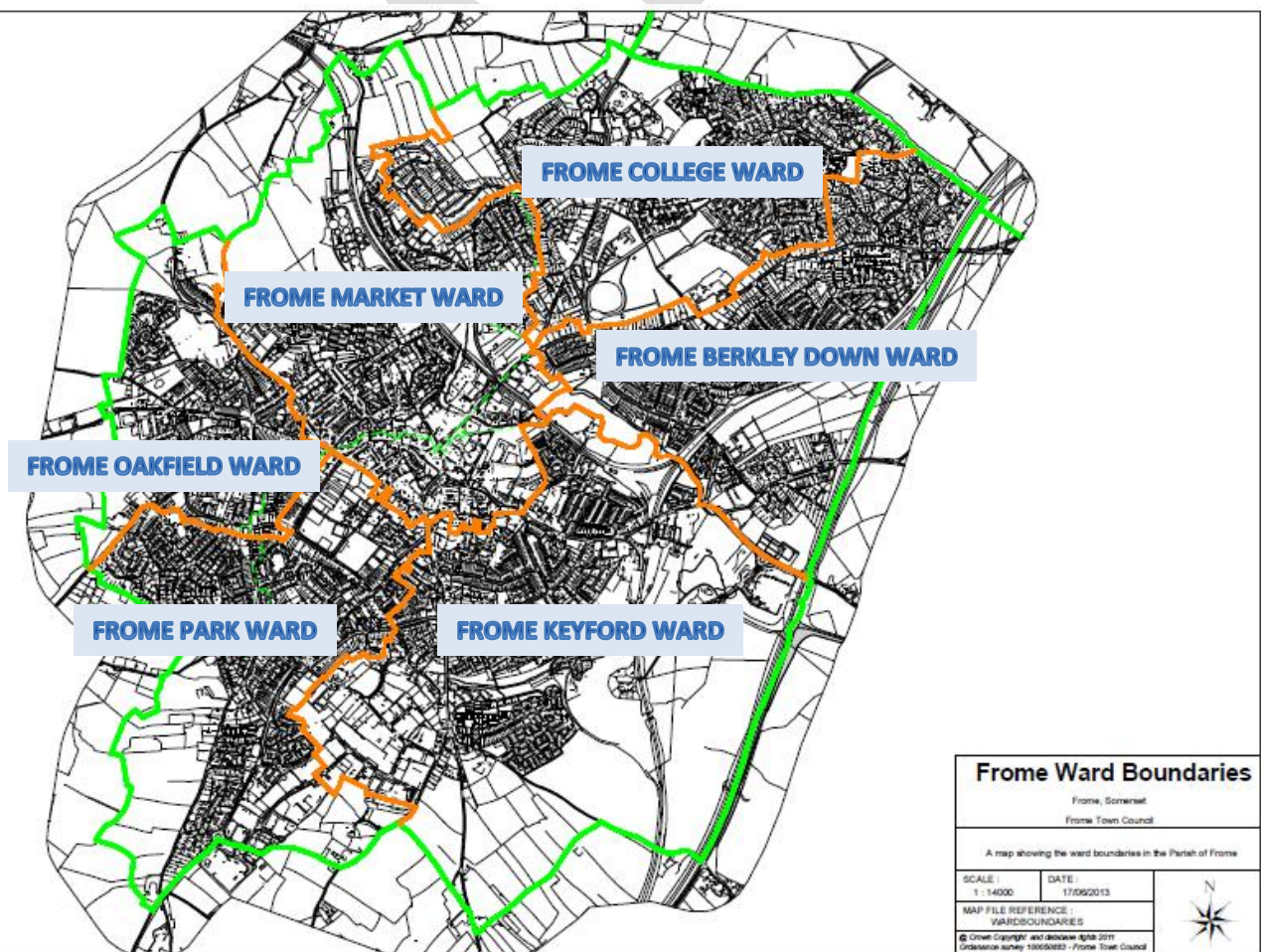
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Frome Town Councillors

The Town Council has 17 Councillors elected for a term of four years. The Civic year runs from May to April. The election of the Mayor, who is the Chairman of the Council, and the Deputy Mayor, takes place at the Annual Town Council Meeting each May. These roles are filled by Councillors who have been nominated and voted for by their fellow Councillors. The Council also elects a Leader of the Council.

Councillors have to act within the ethical framework laid down by law and must sign a Code of Conduct. They have decided to remain unpaid, and currently do not receive any attendance allowance or payments for their duties, which they undertake on a purely voluntary basis. The Mayor receives a small allowance to cover the expenses of their public office.

The town is split into six areas, known as wards.
