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Message from the Mayor, Peter Macfadyen

What is the role of a Town Mayor in the twenty first century? And how can the role enhance that of a Town Council seeking to re-engineer the relationship between local government and the people? The Mayor clearly has a formal role to represent the townspeople at certain functions – such as the Remembrance service – and to chair the main council meetings.

There are occasions where tradition and history are important in establishing how a town sees itself and expresses this. As Mayor from May 2014-15, I sought to recognise those events and respect the role as the honour that it is, while also trying to ensure that the Mayor, Council and staff became more easily accessible and relevant to the people of the town.

As a Council we have made great strides to reduce the formality of meetings and enable greater engagement and to seek ways in which both staff and councillors become more available to the public. I – and all the immediate Mayors – have made the case that the Mayor can lead this message. We recognise that this may upset some for whom the formality and historical status of the role takes precedence. My testing of that boundary with a large number of different Mayoral chains was, on balance, widely enjoyed and accepted – demonstrating that change can indeed be positive.

This is especially important because we need to recognise that the relationship between local government and the people of Frome needs to evolve. With central government austerity reducing the County and District Councils' ability to fund anything outside what they legally have to provide, the onus will fall more and more on Frome to provide for ourselves. Last year the Town Council took further steps towards control of land (primarily the Dippy and the old Showground) and regaining the old Park Road Social Services building for the community.

In these and other cases we are building relationships with the community to make the decisions on how these relationships will be managed, then to support the people to do this. This is a vital difference in approach by the Council – working to support the community to provide, rather than to provide itself. While clearly this makes financial sense, it also places the Council as part of the community constantly looking to bring more people into decision making and ownership of the town in a broad sense.

So, my year as Mayor aimed to underpin this adjustment. I have strived to clearly signal that councillors are members of this community, undertaking an important voluntary role, aiming to both lead and take decisions, while also looking to constantly tap the enthusiasm, experience and skills in Frome. The year ended just after an election which demonstrated an extraordinary level of engagement in democracy here, with all seats contested and a record number of candidates – a solid signal that the direction the Council is taking is being recognised.

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About Frome Town Council

Frome Town Council was formed in 1974 following the reorganisation of local government in England.

Frome Town Council is the parish authority for the town of Frome and is the largest of the 52 parishes in the Mendip District. It is the first tier of local government working with Somerset County Council and Mendip District Council.

How are we funded?

Each year the Town Council calculates the money it needs to raise to provide its services and any projects planned for the year ahead. Then it deducts the income that it expects to receive from fundraising and other income leaving a net amount. This sum, called the precept, is the amount it levies on Mendip District Council and which is collected as a proportion of the total Council Tax paid by Frome households. For the financial year 2014/15 the precept was £1,022,787

Frome Town Councillors

The Town Council has 17 Councillors elected for a term of four years. The civic year runs from May to April. The election of the Mayor, the Deputy Mayor and the Chair of the Council takes place at the Annual Town Council Meeting in May. These two roles are filled by Councillors who have been nominated and voted for by their fellow Councillors. The Council also elects a Leader of the Council.

Councillors have to act within the ethical framework laid down by law and must sign a Code of Conduct. They have decided to remain unpaid, and currently do not receive any attendance allowance or payments for their duties, which they undertake on a voluntary basis. The Mayor receives a small allowance to cover the expenses of their public office.
