Cork street car park to get a revamp

Frome Town Council has been working with Mendip District Council (MDC) to secure some improvements to the town centre's car parks. The good news is that MDC have just confirmed that Cork Street Car Park is going to get a revamp including: resurfacing; new signage and repairs to railings. The date is to be announced shortly but we expect this work to start in June. In addition, they will also tidy up a number of the other car parks in the town soon after.

This project is part of a broader initiative to make the town centre streets and public spaces more attractive, welcoming and functional. Amongst other things, particular attention is being paid this year to remove obsolete posts and signage, introducing better signage and information for visitors, and improving the car parks. Frome Town Council received numerous reports of fish being fatally affected by a spill, effecting multiple locations of the River Frome last week. We had reported this to the Environment Agency and liaised with the EA to try to find out what had happened.

"The Environment Agency was notified of a large fish kill on the River Frome in Frome town centre, Somerset, on Thursday 12 May 2016.

We have received a total of 14 reports from members of public reporting this pollution since early afternoon on Thursday 12 May 2016.

Environment Agency officers attended the River Frome on Thursday evening to investigate this pollution and assess the number of fish deaths.

Due to the high concentrations of ammonia in the river and low oxygen levels, a large number of fish were in distress or dying. Our Operations Delivery team deployed hydrogen peroxide to the river on Thursday evening to help restore levels of dissolved oxygen.

By morning on Friday 13 May the oxygen levels in the river had increased to 42% and ammonia levels had greatly reduced.

Further investigation was undertaken on Friday 13 May by Environment Management officers, during which time the source of the pollution was discovered. It appears that slurry had been released from a farm.

During our investigations on Friday 13 May, fisheries officers counted 1,604 dead fish. Species affected included Roach, Trout, Chub, Pike, Dace, Bream, Perch, Bullhead, Gudgeon, Stickleback and Minnow. Many more could have already washed downstream or been eaten by wildlife. Breakdown of fish casualties:

588 – major (larger) fish species: Roach, Chub, Dace, Trout, Perch, Gudgeon, Bream and Pike 1016 – minor (smaller) species: Bullhead, Minnow, Stoneloach, Sticklebacks 1604 – overall

An invertebrate survey has been undertaken to assess the impact of the pollution on invertebrate life. The pollution is being treated as a Category 1 incident (the most serious) due to the number of fish killed and impact on the environment. We are currently collating all of the evidence gathered by Environment Agency officers. This will be used to decide our enforcement response.

We are continuing to monitor the water quality of the River Frome. The water quality of the River Frome in Frome town centre is currently good."
