The role of Mayor seems to fall into three main elements. First is the only legal requirement: that I chair the meetings of Frome Town Council.

Second is the ceremonial role. Traditionally the first Mayoral engagement is the Blessing

It was my fortune to be Mayor for the 50th Anniversary of Frome Town Council, and hundreds of you joined us for a celebration in the park. The High Sheriff of Somerset joined that one, and Rob Beckley cut quite the dashing figure in his formal uniform and bicorn hat – I felt quite upstaged, but then I've got used to that as I work so closely with Martin, our flamboyant Town Crier!


Christmas was another highlight – it's worth being Mayor just for that one night on the balcony for Light the Night! Judging the Mayor's Christmas card competition and choosing a winner from among hundreds of wonderful entries was no mean feat, but I loved the winning design from Frida so much that I sent it to friends and family around the world – so her artwork is now in Germany, Denmark, France, the US and Australia!

Overlaid on all these regular events is the third part of the Mayor's role, celebrating specific milestones and events for some of the nearly 200 voluntary and not-for-profit organisations that make Frome tick. Among them were cutting the ribbon on a new play area in Welshmill Woods, the stunning mural in the Westway and the wonderfully refurbished Roundhouse at the Otherside, handing out awards, marking important birthdays and anniversaries such as the centenary of Frome Memorial Theatre and welcoming Rev. Seamus Hargrave as the new vicar of St John's.

I have ridden the Saxonvale rollercoaster with the town, marked the long-awaited opening of a banking hub and presented Civic Awards to some of the fantastic people who contribute so much to life in Frome. It's been a great year as Frome's Mayor – but I am looking forward to a quieter diary for a while!



2024 brought a watershed moment. With Somerset Council in financial emergency, we faced the risk of losing many valued assets and services. In response, we produced the Frome Devolution Deal Prospectus, setting out a clear vision for the town's future. Through this work, we demonstrated how greater local control over assets, budgets and responsibilities could better serve our community and improve quality of life for everyone. At the heart of this proposal was a shared commitment to partnership between Somerset Council, Frome Town Council and our residents, working together to unlock Frome's potential and ensure the town remains thriving,

What was included in it?

sustainable and inclusive

Aspirations to transfer of over 50 open spaces to Frome Town Council as Somerset Council no longer had the resources to maintain these crucial assets. Now owned by FTC, we are maintaining these spaces and creating management plans to ensure they are managed in a way that reflects the values and needs of residents. Obtaining a long lease on part of the Highways Depot allows for plant and materials storage and an accessible operation base for the Rangers.

The transfer of key assets at Frome Riverside including market rights and operations, and the toilet block, allowed us to keep the markets running and the toilets open while we worked on longer-term plans. The deal also included the **freehold of riverbanks** and a lot of aspects that allow us to take responsibility for economic development in the town centre.

The **Key Centre** was once a vibrant community hub, but available services and usage have diminished in recent years and there was a risk of permanent closure. Thanks to the devolution deal, we took over the Key Centre and **Mount Community Garden** in early 2025 and have begun the work of recreating a welcoming and inclusive space for the community to gather and for vital early help services.

The final section centred on sustainability. This included working to create a Movement Strategy and working to create a Reuse Centre

Some of our highlights Grow community wellbeing

Kindness, connection and community are at the heart of everything we do. This collaborative approach doesn't just help us get more done; it builds something deeper: the strong connections that are vital for community wellbeing and a sense of belonging.

"I am part of community groups in Frome and they give me a great sense of belonging." - Building a Picture of Frome, 2024 An example of this approach is the networking, sharing of information and resources, (and sometimes a delicious curry) at FTC's regular Community Organisations meetings These gatherings bring together local groups to share resources and ideas in our welcoming, well-used town hall.

Like many civic buildings, the town hall sees lower footfall from younger residents. A quarter of Frome's residents were

aged 18 and under at the last UK census, so making them feel welcome in

their town hall is a priority.

Adventures at... the town hall

In November 2024, in partnership with community arts adventurers
Terrestrial, 'Adventures at the Town
Hall' invited young people to take charge. That very day, in Frome Town
Hall, a forest grew...there was music, art, outdoor crafts, an ingenious escape room designed by young participants and a set of new rules for Frome.

Terrestrial's Director Tom Spencer says:
"At the heart of this wild set of arts
experiences was an invitation for young
people to feel their creativity has real power."



School Council Voice project

We captured the voices of young people aged 4 to 19 who shared their priorities for their school or educational setting and for Frome as a whole. The most-mentioned topics were access to parks and open spaces, friends and friendship, helping and respecting others, keeping Frome clean – and lunch! The findings are already embedded into FTC's work programme for 2025/26.



Frome Welcome Hub

The Welcome Hub marked another year of supporting displaced persons and those seeking asylum, offering a safe, welcoming space, signposting, practical support and a range of social and cultural opportunities.

Discover Frome

Our Discover Frome site provides a one-stop-shop for tourist and 'what's on' information, with more than 500,000 website visits in 2024/25. Throughout the year, we've been working on a major refresh of this valued resource. In Frome Library, our dedicated volunteers at the Discover Frome Information Point have welcomed three new people to their team and helped with thousands of face-to-face enquires.

Badgers Hill stadium

We secured external funding for much-needed improvements to the facilities at Badgers Hill stadium, including installing solar panels to bring down running costs and improve the carbon footprint of the ground and building new changing areas, showers and toilets.

Town Centre improvements

Our town centre ranger Mike was equipped with a new street sweeper this year to keep Frome's cobbled streets looking their best. We also improved the look of Frome's shopping streets with projects including a vibrant

new mural at Chateau Gontier, a temporary installation in the Market Place telling the story of the River Frome, and new wildflower planters on Catherine Hill in partnership with local businesses. We've worked with colleagues at Somerset Council to tackle waste management and improve access to recycling.

Cultivate environmental sustainability

New Climate Action Lead

Our Climate Action Lead Matt Mellen joined the FTC team in autumn 2024 to head up our renewable energy project Solar and Beyond, develop a Climate Action Plan for Frome and work on our Green and Healthy Frome project strands, Heathy Homes, Cycle Together and Plastic Free, Period.

Healthy Homes

Our team of Energy Advice Champions grew in 2024/25 and a series of one-off and regular pop-up sessions at venues across Frome, including Frome Medical Centre, Frome Jobcentre and the Westway precinct offered face-to-face support and advice to help makes homes warmer, drier and more energy efficient: benefitting health, planet and pocket.

Spaces for people and wildlife to thrive

Our focus on creating spaces for people and wildlife to thrive takes many forms. We're contributing to global data collection initiatives through our bat, toad and frog counts and the Community Wildlife Mapping project. In February 2025, members of Frome Wild Bunch represented this commitment to supporting wildlife in a stunning window display at the town hall for the annual Frome Window Wonderland.

The way we manage our open spaces prioritises biodiversity, play and community, including new play equipment for Egford Park and Welshmill Park, picnic benches, seating, and a refurbished wooden Roundhouse on the Otherside. We improved access and laid a new path to the community hub at Broadway Community Gardens and worked with Friends of the River Frome to buy a water meadow at Adderwell. The land has huge environmental significance and also secures continuous pedestrian access to the River Frome from Wallbridge to Spring Gardens.

Some of our highlights Improve assets and infrastructure

We know that helping our community thrive means making sure Frome has the physical and organisational infrastructure to support its growth. This includes advocating for affordable and sustainable housing, access to services and green spaces, safe active travel routes and reliable transport links.

Safer School Streets

The Safer School Streets trial began in April 2024 with monitoring, engagement and further improvements taking place this year. The scheme addresses longstanding concerns about road safety around schools by creating a 20mph zone on key roads, reducing traffic at drop-off and pick-up times and introducing a number of traffic calming measures.

One of the most impactful improvements came in April 2025 – a new zebra crossing and improved cyclist access at The Butts.

Planning

Our Planning team responded to 220 applications including major proposed developments such as Saxonvale, Selwood Garden Community and Packsaddle. Some of these proposals sparked passionate debate at planning meetings and among the community. The team create strong responses that push for sustainable and affordable housing, infrastructure to support increased demand on roads and services, and the protection of natural habitats.

Improved green spaces

We worked with neighbourhoods to improve their local green spaces. The largest of these projects was at Milk Street Green, where Trinity Community Group, local residents, schoolchildren and FTC staff and rangers transformed the green into a hub for the community, with flowerbeds, benches and imaginative play structures.

Some of our highlights Be a bold and effective town council

In 2024, we celebrated 50 years of Frome Town Council by bringing the community together for a big party. We looked back on a rich legacy – five decades of councillors and staff working together for the common good. And we looked forward, creating our 2025-27 plan that lays out the next steps towards our vision of a Frome that is thriving, sustainable and inclusive.

Building a Picture of our Town

We launched a large-scale engagement and data collection project to create a snapshot of the people of Frome, what they value and their current concerns. We heard from 973 people and presented our findings in a report and several data dashboards that have been a valuable tool for both FTC and other organisations in the town, to understand the priorities and needs of the people we serve.

Clear and engaging comms

Our Communications & Marketing team continued to create press releases, social media campaigns, posters, leaflets and website pages that explain the council's work and projects in a way that prioritises transparency and invites people to get involved and share their thoughts.



At the town hall

Our Customer Service Advisors Tracy and Sian, Town Hall Steward Sean and Events Administrator Nykki work hard facilitating bookings and events in the Town Hall, and supporting community events by lending free equipment. The town hall is a hub for the community and host to important drop-in services such as Citizens' Advice and our own Welcome Hub, as well as meetings of all hapes and sizes, and weddings.

Our HR and Finance teams have supported several new starters this year and arranged an array of valuable training opportunities for staff. They managed a smooth transition to Lemon booking, and Xero accounting software, training all staff to use ApprovalMax for creating purchase orders and approving bills. They also kept us going, paying the bills, and leaving us in a strong financial position to face the challenges of the coming year.



Frome Town Council – A Year

It was a year when important decisions had to be made that will shape the town for many years to come. Firstly, we had to react to the dire financial situation Somerset Council are in. We produced a devolution prospectus outlining our approach to protecting key services, assets and the fabric of the town. The first phase included taking on 57 new open spaces across the town including play areas, taking on the Key Centre and the Frome Weekly Markets and preventing the Market Place toilets from closing permanently. We were of course conscious that we had to keep our spending under control and have worked hard to give value for money to residents.

Planning applications for Selwood Garden Community and Packsaddle needed a final decision by Somerset Council, both very complex sites and, as ever with planning applications, there were some passionate discussions. Both ended up going to appeal, decided by national government. At year end we are awaiting the final decision on these sites. Badgers Hill took up a lot of bandwidth across the organisation too, as we worked to find a sustainable way forward, that would allow football to be played at the site for decades to come, plus benefits for the community as a whole.

We also made progress in protecting and improving the places that matter most to local people. The transfer of open spaces that could no longer be cared for by Somerset Council keeps them in public hands for the long term, enhancing biodiversity and ensuring they remain places for everyone to enjoy. Work at Victoria Park and Mary Baily has continued with the community's ideas at its heart, setting out a long-term vision for these much-loved green spaces.

The town centre has remained busy and full of life. We've continued to support our independent traders, markets and events, all of which keep Frome distinctive and welcoming. Our 'Discover Frome' campaign helped attract visitors and footfall, bringing benefits to local shops, cafés and creative businesses.

We have also kept our focus on the climate and ecological emergency. Bold partnership projects like Safer School Streets and Green and Healthy Frome, Retrofit, community energy schemes and the expansion of the Wild About Trees and wildflower programmes have all made tangible contributions to reducing emissions and improving local biodiversity.

The council has worked hard to support those facing cost-of-living pressures. We have created and shared community advice and information, promoted warm spaces, and provided grant funding and other support to local organisations such as Fair Frome and The Good Heart. These partnerships are what make Frome resilient – neighbours helping and supporting each other when times are tough.

We've continued to involve residents in shaping decisions about their town. Themed council meetings and engagement activities, as well as town-wide engagement project Building a Picture of Frome, really enable us to embed our residents' experiences of life in Frome in our work. Our links with local schools have helped young people make their voices heard too, reminding us that decisions today shape their futures most of all.

We have stood firm on the need for sustainable, well-designed housing that fits the town's character. Our input into the Selwood Garden Community process has undoubtedly kept community benefit and environmental standards at the centre of discussions, even as plans evolve.

Cultural life continues to flourish. Events like the Christmas Lantern Parade, Frome Festival and a host of community projects have brought people together. We also commissioned a new mural at the Westway centre, celebrating Frome's connection to our river and the wildlife it sustains.

Through it all, we've made sure that Frome's voice is heard loud and clear within the wider Somerset structure. We've shown that local decisions made by local people lead to better results – practical, fair and community-driven.

Frome Town Council is entirely independent, and has been since 2015. We are a group of 17 individuals, ranging in age from 26-77. We are not always in agreement – in fact, we rarely are. This leads to passionate discussions but always with the shared aim of achieving the best for the town. We have

a wealth of experience within our group, across many sectors of society. However, our strength is not in the individual but in the sum of our parts: how we listen to our residents, and share our experiences and perspectives to reach decisions and find solutions. We as councillors would not achieve a fraction of what we do without the dedication and expertise of council staff body we have the privilege of working with.

There continue to be big challenges ahead, but Frome has always been resilient. We have shown time and again that when faced with uncertainty, our community comes together. I have no doubt we will do so again.
